

New schedule change to ease train crowding

You talked, we listened.

To relieve crowding for rush hour commuters, last month BART made changes to our schedule.

The new schedule provides longer trains, increases service during the morning and evening commute, and provides more frequent service to Oakland International Airport.

Since the schedule change went into effect last month, the number of cars in service is at an all-time high.

Improvements include:

- Additional trains on the Yellow Line
- Extension of weekday Red Line service to 9 pm
- Longer trains on the Blue and Green Lines
- Making three-car trains into four-car trains on the Orange Line during off-peak periods

BART has also hired more maintenance staff to get cars out of the shop and back in service faster.
