Uptown Bike Station offers free, secure parking

New facility has space for 130 bicycles, plus bike maintenance and gear

Two-wheeled commuters in Oakland now have a safe, convenient and free place to park their bicycles – at the 19th Street Uptown Bike Station.

The indoor station opened last month, and it serves as a secure facility for BART commuters to park their bikes and have easy access to the 19th Street/Oakland station.

The station is located at the corner of 19th Street and Broadway in Downtown Oakland and can accommodate 130 parked bikes. It's open from 7am to 9pm, Monday through Friday.

Using the station is easy – bring your bicycle through the front door, and a bike station employee will take your bike and secure it free of charge. The cost to leave your bike overnight is \$5.

The hub is multi-purpose – riders can not only store their bicycles in a secure location, but a retail operation offers bike repair and bike accessories.

"We want to encourage people to ride their bike to BART," said Steve Beroldo, BART Bike Program Manager. "Parking is safe and the new station offers bike maintenance, making it convenient and accessible to everybody."

BART partnered with the City of Oakland to make this project a reality, and it was constructed with support from the Safe Routes to Transit Grant program and Regional Measure 2 funds.

The 19th Street Uptown Bike Station is in addition

to the eight BikeLink lockers located on the street level and 124 bike parking spots located on the concourse level at 19th Street/Oakland Station, which Beroldo noted are near capacity every day.

Additional BART bike stations are located at Downtown Berkeley, Ashby, Embarcadero and Fruitvale BART stations. Visit bart.gov/bikes for more information.

Station Profile Survey gathers vital data

Last month, BART kicked off the granddaddy of all BART research surveys – the Station Profile Survey. The survey will provide a treasure trove of data to guide the agency and help the public in the future.

It's the largest and oldest of all BART surveys, done approximately every six-to-10 years since 1973, like BART's version of the U.S. Census. The massive compilation of statistics last was conducted in 2008.

Survey-takers will use tablet computers to enter answers from in-person interviews to be conducted mainly on platforms from randomly selected participants.

The survey takes about five minutes. You will know the survey-takers by their

"You can't volunteer or walk up and ask to take the survey, because it's important that results reflect a statistically valid random sampling of BART ridership," said Maureen Wetter, BART research analyst and manager of the project.

Around 30 survey-takers may be in the field at any one time, covering all hours of service, all days of the week, and all stations. The survey also is available in multiple languages and in different formats for people with disabilities.

The Station Profile Survey aims to collect over 38,000 responses and is expected to continue until the end of May. For details on the Station Profile Survey go to bart.gov/survey.


