- Available Online
 To accommodate the widest practical range of users and uses
- Open License (or No License)
 Anyone has permission to use and reuse
- Machine-readable
 Large datasets can be analyzed or combined with other data efficiently
- Free of Charge
 Anyone can access it no matter their budget




Monthly Service Data Calls (2015)





Annual Service Data Calls


